How did the crowd receive Peter's message?

Acts 2 is a very familiar passage to all Christians. The day of Pentecost has arrived. The 120 are in the upper room. You have the apostles, Mary ,the mother of Jesus, and a small band of followers. They are all together in one place. A noise like a violent rushing wind fills the room. The Holy Spirit comes to empower the church. And, a large crowd is drawn to the resulting declaration of the "Mighty Deeds of God". The crowd is amazed, perplexed, bewildered, and astonished that they are all hearing this proclamation in their own language. Some asked, "What does this mean?" While others said, "These folks must be drunk".

So, what was the crowd like? Was this a bunch of trouble makers, late night partiers? Acts 2:5 says, "Now there were Jews living in Jerusalem, devout men from every nation under heaven". The crowd was the most religious crowd you could find. These were devout Jews who had arrived in Jerusalem to celebrate the Feast of Pentecost. Many of these folks would have been in Jerusalem 7 weeks earlier to celebrate Passover. If you were looking for a group of God fearing, religious people, this was your place.

Now, think about what Peter says to the crowd and how they would have received the message. Acts 2:14-21 says that Peter explains to the crowd that the 120 are not drunk. Peter explains the situation by quoting the prophet Joel. This passage describes the last days leading up to the glorious day of the Lord and that all who call on the name of the Lord will be saved. Then, Peter gets real direct in verses 22-36 by telling them that Jesus of Nazareth was shown to be the Messiah through signs and wonders. Peter says that they should have full knowledge of all that Jesus did. And on top of that, Peter tells them that they nailed lesus to a cross. At the end of Peter's message he says in verse 36, "Therefore let all the house of Israel know for certain that God has made Him both Lord and Christ whom you crucified." At this point the crowd is pierced to the heart.

Vs 24 begins with "But God raised Him up again..." To you and me that is great news. But to the

crowd that killed Jesus that is bad news. Usually when you murder someone you would want them to stay dead. Now Peter is declaring that not only is Jesus alive but that according to verse 35 God will make all His enemies a footstool for His feet. So, think about this from the crowd's perspective. They were at Passover and a trial and crucifixion occurs. They arrive 7 weeks later to hear the news that the man who was killed is now alive. And that Jesus is the Christ. And that God is going to place His enemies under Jesus's feet. So, who are the enemies of God in this setting? The religious crowd who murdered the Messiah had to see themselves as being a part of that group. Thus they are cut to the heart and they ask Peter, "What are we to do?" Peter responds in verse 38, "Repent and be baptized for the forgiveness of your sins and you will receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." Peter also declares that this is the promise for all who the Lord will call to Himself. Now finally the crowd gets some good news.

But wait, the whole message was good news. The whole message was the Gospel. Sometimes we may have a warped view of who we were before salvation. Ephesians 2:1 tells us, "And you were dead in your trespasses and sins". The whole analogy that we were drowning and we reached up for the saving hand of Jesus is missing the mark. Dead men don't reach. Or maybe we have heard the view that we are all God's children but we have just gone astray. We just need to dust ourselves off and start going to church and acting right. That is not the Gospel. The good news is that we were dead in our sins and that God saves us through His son Jesus. We needed a resurrection. We needed to turn in repentance and place our faith in Jesus and that is only done by the work of God's Holy Spirit convicting our hearts. This whole passage includes 4 parts: A person like Peter who proclaimed the Gospel, The Word of God, The hearer of the word who must turn in faith, and, the vital component, God. God is the offended party with whom we must be held accountable. God's punishment is what God saves us from. We who were dead are now alive due to the finished work of Christ - that is a glorious message. The fact that God raised Jesus from the dead is now very good news indeed. We who once were God's enemies have been saved by His Grace. Amen and Amen.

Secretariat Spotlight-Leaders (Team B)!!!

The Constitution and By-laws state the following in regards to the Leaders (Team B) role: that it must be filled by a married couple, both having served as Rectors, responsible for second and fourth weekends each year.

There will be two couples serving in the Leaders position, with each couple having one vote. It is noted that one leader's couple may actually be two individuals, not married to each other, in this instance each individual would have one vote. (Effective 01/04/2002). They will share the position and alternate responsibilities each weekend. The Leaders Couple will be the mentor to each new rector and facilitate the training of the rector and the team leadership. The Leaders Couples duties include the following: Meet with each new rector during Orientation with the Chairman and Head Spiritual Director and help schedule training dates for the team. Train the rector on Policy, Procedures, Essentials, Team Selection and Team formation by providing training materials in these areas. Work with the rector in approving each team member selected and assist the rector in documenting their choices in an organized digital spreadsheet. This spreadsheet will be presented to Secretariat Leadership (Chairman and Head Spiritual Director) for approval. Train the Heads (Head Cha, Asst Head Cha, BUR, Head Kitchen and Asst Head Kitchen). Train the Professors and Area Heads. Attend the second team meeting and provide instructions and encouragement to the team. Regularly update the Secretariat on the rector's and team's progress. Meet with the rector after their weekend to be debriefed concerning any issues or questions that may have occurred on the weekend in an effort to improve the process for future weekends. All Training will be facilitated by the Leaders Couple and digital copies of the training material will be emailed to each individual unless they are not computer literate and in that case a paper copy will be provide. Participate in the overall guidance and planning of the Tres Dias activities

Vida Nueva is a weekend retreat for young men and women ages 15-20. Vida Nueva is Spanish for "New Life" and like the Tres Dias, VN weekends are intended as an encounter with Jesus Christ. The weekends are similar to the structure of a Tres Dias weekend with certain changes to make it more relevant for teens. VN weekends begin on Friday evening and end on Sunday evening.
