Meditation

On October 29th 1992, I was driven to a church about an hour from our house where my name was called and I was loaded on a bus with a bunch of guys who looked to be about as nervous as I knew I was. We were then serenaded by a grinning group of men and women singing some barnyard song as they performed hand motions for the animals they were singing about. The bus then pulled out and an hour later we went right back past my house to a campground a few miles north of where we lived. The campground was located off the main road and the bus never made it past the entrance because it couldn't pull the gravel hill so we walked the last mile or so of our journey in the dark. That is how G.M.T.D #1, my Tres Dias weekend started and at that point I felt like asking the question that Jerry Clower did at the snake handling church - "where's the back door or where do you reckon they'd want one". I wanted to go home. I didn't. And 28 years later there is no place I'd rather be than on a Tres Dias weekend. I tasted grace as never before as it was served to me by those men on that weekend and through those three days God changed me forever.

This community and the God who we serve has blessed Tammy and I over the years in more ways than we could recount and it remains a precious thing to us to be given the privilege of serving on a weekend. Which brings us to 2020. The first year in the history of Georgia Mountains Tres Dias that no weekends have taken place. And I miss it... badly. And I imagine you do as well. Unless you have a

lot better prophetic gift than I do 2020 has not been the year that we expected. And when things don't go as we expect our knee jerk reaction can be to question God. "Where are you and why aren't you doing more to get things back in line with how we expected this year to go?" Our questions don't bother God but when the answers don't come as quickly or in the manner we want our faith can take a hit and we begin to wonder deep down if the plans and promises of God have been derailed. I imagine we've all dealt with that to some extent this year so maybe this is an appropriate time to consider the Virgin Mary and what her life can teach us about expectations.

Here was a 15 year old girl minding her own business and making plans to be wed when she is visited by the angel Gabriel and informed that she had found favor with God and would give birth to the Messiah, the savior of all mankind. Mary struggled to believe the angel's words but eventually trusted this promise and uttered that beautiful faith-filled response -"Let it be unto me according to your will". As Gabriel departed I would imagine that Mary's head was spinning trying to imagine what her life would become as the expectant mother of the King of Kings. I think it's safe to say that her experience did not match her expectations. She immediately became a social outcast because she got pregnant while engaged but not yet married. No one believed her story that she was pregnant by the Holy Spirit; not even Joseph. In fact he was going to have her sent away quietly until an angel appeared to him (possibly Gabriel again) and informed Joseph that what Mary had told him was true.

And at some point we as a community will once again be able to meet and laugh and plan and worship; to love on and pray for each other and most importantly to once again see the Father touch new Pescadores powerfully with His amazing grace and we'll smile...because we know just what they're feeling. I can't wait!!

Vida Nueva is a weekend retreat for young men and women ages 15-20. Vida Nueva is Spanish for "New Life" and like the Tres Dias, VN weekends are intended as an encounter with Jesus Christ.
